Jacques became aware of the need for the Orphanage to protect owls & other local bird species on the West Coast.

He creates awareness in the local communities on the importance of caring for our flora and fauna.

The Owl Orphanage is a rehabilitation center for mainly Birds of Prey and Blue Cranes. Here we look after injured, poisoned and orphaned birds until they are ready for release back into the wild.












WHY THE OWL ORPHANAGE?

Indigenous birds & wildlife are increasingly threatened by numerous factors:





Johanna Stockings

- Hit by a car.
- Torn ligaments in upper left leg, damaged wing feathers, broken toe.
- Spent a month in a sling.
- Today she can stand, walk and run.
- Will be released once primary feathers regrow on wing.






Booted Eagle

- Second chance to live after some experts said that she will never fly again and should be euthanized.
- Knowing that we could help, we took her in.
- Her wounds healed completely, and she flew beautifully.
- We learned that she was part of a breeding pair at the West Coast Fossil Park.
- After the male returned from migration, we reunited them back at the Park.
- With love rekindled, it didn't take long before the pair started nest building.
- She spent 7 long months with us waiting for the return of the 'love of her life'.



Princess Piesang

- She was found drowning in a water trough on a farm.
- It took us 5 days to pull her through.
- Not only did she prove us all wrong, but she grew up, becoming a beautiful young lady.
- Once able to fly, she would spend her nights by the river and returned to the centre for food and rest.
- After some months she integrated with the wild cranes visiting the farm every year.
- One morning she stumbled up to our gate with legs entangled in baling string. After we removed the string, she went back to the fields.
- Even though she does not come to the centre at all anymore,
 we still get to see her in the fields at times.







WHAT WE NEED FROM YOU

Immediate needs for the new & improved rehabilitation centre

- 60 X "100 x 120 x 4.2m" green gum poles (No tar)
- 200m Black Shade net 40% 3m or 4m
- 30 x 4.5m Corrugate Iron Roof Sheeting
- 3 x 5000L water tanks
- 6 Truck loads of laterite soil or G5 road fill.
- 2 x Pylon US 3000C batteries for existing solar system (Crucial)
- 4 x 30m x 1.5m galvanized wire mesh
- 4 x medium sized plastic dog travel boxes
- 1 x large sized plastic dog travel box
- 1500lt p/h solar borehole pump
- 2 x large growing tunnel frames

Other critical needs

- A 4x4 vehicle for the rescue and transportation of the animals.
- Monetary donations for food, medication, veterinarian bills for the animals and staff salaries.
- Sponsorships of any birds in care being rehabilitated.
